- 2. The growth in turnout alone provided the margin of victory in several key states



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"The Latino Vote" versus "Latino Voters"

- 1. More than 16.5M Latinos voted, an increase of over 30% from 2016
- 2. The growth in turnout alone provided the margin of victory in several key states
- 3. Latino voters are diverse, Miami is as representative of all Latino voters, as Vermont is representative of all White voters
- 4. Comparisons to 2016 vote share are lazy and misguided
 - The 2016 Clinton-Trump dynamic produced an outlier election close to the 75-25 range in Latino vote
 - The 2020 election is not a dramatic increase for Trump, but rather a return to the average 70-30 vote share that Latinos demonstrated during the Obama years
- 5. Latino families have been hit hard by COVID, both health and economic impacts, and expect the government to act on major stimulus legislation










Hispanic Vote in Florida




COVID Economic Impact on Latinos

Latinos have been disproportionally economically impacted by the pandemic.

Latino households have lost work or income (lay off, pay cut, closing their business) due to the pandemic.

* 1 in 4 Latino voters are currently unemployed and looking for work Percent of households that experienced a job loss, pay cut, and/or closed a business they own due to the pandemic.
